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HABITAT FOR HUMANITY BUILDS IN DUNKIRK

It has been over 20 years since Habitat for Humanity worked on a new build in Dunkirk. The work started in early May 2024 with the building of exterior and interior walls at an off-site facility. In June, with the help of volunteers from several area companies, the walls were brought to Genet Street and completely erected over a two-day period. Over the next week the roof was completed, and then the windows and doors were put in. By the middle of October the house was sided, the yard was landscaped, the driveway was established, concrete was poured to form the front and side entries, and plumbing and electrical work was completed, thanks to local tradesmen donating their time. Next came the insulation of the exterior walls and ceilings.

Sheetrocking the ceiling and walls will be completed by the time this newsletter goes to print. Painting of the walls and ceilings, laying tile on the floors, and installing trim work and interior doors will take place over the Winter and Spring months, and hopefully the family will be in the house shortly after the one-year mark.

Almost all of the work to build this house has been accomplished by a dedicated group of volunteers, as well as by the new homeowner and her friends and family, working what amounts to about 4 to 5 hours a week. 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CHAUTAUQUA AREA HABITAT FOR HUMANITY Accomplishments, 3 Years after COVID

Since 2020 the CAHfH volunteers have been busy at work in 3 areas of the county. Two more families have started their monthly mortgage payments and these properties were added back to the tax rolls in Chautauqua County.

In the City of Jamestown,

the dedicated volunteers completed another home at 1087 North Main Street after many delays. The dedication was held in August 2024. This renovation project



included working with Mary Robinson from the Jamestown Renaissance Corporation that funds Jamestown paint and porch projects, and with Crystal Surdyk of the Development Department in the City of Jamestown. Many hands helped make this project successful for the family and the community.

In the Village of Silver

<u>Creek</u>, a new home construction project was completed (Number 7 in Silver Creek) with the help of many volunteers.



That house was dedicated in January 2024. The family of six moved in after the dedication and have had wonderful and healthy experiences living in a house without mold, vermin or a broken oven. They love their new house, and the neighbors have welcomed and helped them get to know the area and have supported the family.

In the City of Dunkirk, it

all started with a Chicken BBQ in May to kick off the groundbreaking on Genet Street. With help from the City of Dunkirk staff, the Building Inspector Glenn



Christen, and Vince DeJoy, Director of Planning and Development, this building project has had few complications.

In addition, the construction is a few weeks ahead of schedule due to the volunteer support from community businesses, AG Team, Wells Corporation, Mike Muldowney warehouse space, Gugino Plumbing and Heating-Cooling, John Castiglia of BECC Electric and Excelco of Silver Creek. Many thanks for all the help contributed to this project. We continue to ask for volunteers to help with the interior finishing of this house.

In the Village of Mayville,

we are pursuing the new construction of a home on N. Erie St. Before we start construction, we are looking for a family to call this their home. We have worked with the Building Inspector and have approval from him and



the Zoning Committee to move forward.

The delay on this project has been the result of the lack of a family to become future homeowners. As a result, the project will not start until 2025. Local residents who are interested in working with CAHFH should contact our Mayville office at 716-844-6955.

In the City of Jamestown, in 2025, we hope to start a new home or renovate a current property. We are also continuing our search for new families to be future family homeowners. BUILDING A PARTNERSHIP: CHAUTAUQUA COUNTY LAND BANK CORPORATION AND CHAUTAUQUA AREA HABITAT FOR HUMANITY

A COLLABORATION TO SUPPORT FAMILIES IN NEED

The Chautauqua County Land Bank Corporation and Chautauqua Area Habitat for Humanity have joined forces in a noble endeavor to purchase and renovate homes for families in need. This partnership signifies a harmonious blend of efforts aimed at providing safe, affordable housing to those who need it. Both organizations have a history of community service and a shared vision of transforming lives through homeownership.

Through this collaboration, Habitat has had access to properties, both vacant lots and houses in need of restoration. Our organizations are united by a common cause. The partnership has also extended its efforts to work closely with the cities of Jamestown and Dunkirk, aiming to revive neighborhoods that would benefit significantly from improved housing.

In accordance with Habitat for Humanity International guidelines, this initiative is not merely a handout but a hand-up for families. The selected future homeowner must meet specific criteria: they must have children under 18 living in their household, their current housing conditions must be deemed deplorable, they should never have owned a home in the past, and they must be willing to invest sweat equity into the housing project. Additionally, these families need to have a stable income to pay for a 20-year low-interest mortgage along with all applicable taxes and insurance.

This partnership is a beacon of hope for many and a call to action for others. HONORING PRESIDENT JIMMY CARTER, A FOREVER VOLUNTEER

President Jimmy Carter has reached a major milestone, celebrating his 100th birthday on Tuesday, October 1. He is the first former U.S. president to reach this venerable and worthy age, and CAHfH takes this opportunity to acknowledge the remarkable gift that he has been both for our country and for Habitat for Humanity! Although he was not the founder of Habitat for Humanity (Millard Fuller was the



founder), Jimmy Carter is its most well-known and ardent volunteer.

Habitat for Humanity was founded in Americus, Georgia, nearby Jimmy and Rosalynn Carter's hometown of Plains. His passion for Habitat and being a grass-roots volunteer for it officially began in September 1984 when the former U. S. president visited a local Habitat building site following a public speaking event at a New York church. More than 4,300 homes since then could be considered a "Carter House," because the Carters have helped build that many homes with more than 100,000 volunteers in 14 countries over nearly 40 years, according to the organization. As recent as five years ago, President Carter showed up at a Habitat for Humanity site in Nashville with a smile – and a black eye. One day earlier, then 95, he had fallen and needed 14 stitches, but he kept up his commitment to the organization.

With Habitat for Humanity our former president has been a forever volunteer, working alongside future homeowners to give new meaning to their lives. President Jimmy Carter entered hospice in February 2023 at his Plains, Georgia, home. We bless him and we thank him for his service through Habitat, and for all that he has done in his amazing life, and we pray him on his journey to his final home.

YOUR DONATIONS ARE THE BACKBONE FOR CAHFH

First and foremost, CAHfH gives thanks to all those who donate yearly to CAHfH! The many donations received during our newsletter drive have made a difference in what the organization can do. Donations are used to fund all the building projects throughout the county.

So, how are your donations used, and what is the process once they are received?

When a donation of \$1.00 or more is received, a personal thank you note is sent and the donation is deposited into the building account. These funds will be used for one or all of the houses being built at that time.

CAHfH has three satellites in Chautauqua County because of the geographic size of the county. Each satellite is under the leadership of the CAHfH Board and receives the funds needed from the CAHfH yearly budget. Funds that make up this budget come from individuals, business sponsors, grants from local foundations, revenue from monthly mortgage payments, interest earned, individual property donations, mortgages that have been sold to banks, and limited federal funds in the cities of Jamestown and Dunkirk. Generally, donations, business sponsors and/or the reductions in their rates for services, and local foundations make the biggest impact on the yearly budget.

What can \$1,000 do when building a house? Here are some of the purchasing options:

- 3 new windows for a house
- 3 new steel entrance doors
- Drywall for 3 bedrooms
- Baseboards and door frame casings
- Floor tile for 3 rooms in the house
